Message from our Executive Director

came across this quote recently, and I thought it was so applicable to the work of hospice. 'You can't do anything about the length of your life, but you can do something about its width and depth'. By Evan Esar.

After 22 Newsletter reports written as Executive Director, this will be my last. On June 30th, I will be leaving Surrey Hospice Society to retire and travel with my husband Steve. We have been planning this transition for quite some time, and I do so with mixed emotions.



It has been an honour and privilege to be in a leadership position within the world of hospice. When I first arrived, I thought I understood palliative care and grief support. It wasn't until I spent many hours in conversation with Barbara Morningstar, our Program Director, and took the Volunteer Training Course - that I had my eyes opened and had a much better understanding of the depth and breadth of this sacred work. It's clear it's not for everyone. It's a calling, and then a choice. Very few choose to go to the depths of life and death with someone (often a stranger) many are not willing or able to go. To walk beside someone and know you are unable to offer a solution to a palliative

diagnosis, or ease the pain and chaos that follows a loss. But one very powerful offering....is to be a companion, to be present, listen intently, as a loving, compassionate neutral presence.

When you get that - you understand more fully what this work is all about.

I experienced it personally when my parents passed away just a few weeks apart. I know what it's like to anticipate a loved ones' death and then experience it. Less than a year later, my grandson Owen Michael was born and died. My father in law passed away recently, and last year my grandson Miles, born in Toronto wasn't expected to live with a rare heart condition. He underwent 3 heart surgeries within his first few months of life, and we headed to Toronto 3 times to support our kids. I am grateful to say he is doing well. He has one more open heart surgery to go when he is 2 or 3 years old. The support I received here at SHS has been amazing. They live what they teach.

When I reflect the growth of the organization in the past 5 ½ years, it is heart warming to see how the community and generous individuals stepped up to the plate in response of our need to expand. Our beautiful Resource & Support Centre was completed to respond to the opening of the new 20 bed Hospice Residence at Laurel Place. Advancing our model by hiring two professional Clinical Grief Counsellors was a new step for us that we felt was necessary with the referrals that were coming to us. Our winning Top Honours in the Community Leader Awards in 2007, and in 2010, the Surrey Board of Trade's Business Excellence Award were both exciting opportunities to tell the story of Hospice to the City of Surrey.

The gifted and experienced members who have sat on our Board of Directors over this past 5+ years have helped us make many decisions to bring change and growth to the Society. When I first came to hospice, Jas Cheema was President, then Brian Clarke, followed by Judi Huta, and now Cindy Poppy. Each brought leadership, skill and direction to the table, and I have enjoyed working with them all.

My gifted staff have worked so hard to bring professionalism and effective response to the operations and administration of Hospice. Thank you Donna and Terri. On the program side directed by Barbara Morningstar - the heart of the work must stay at its core. Barb, Joy, Rosemary and Noele make sure it does. With their training, their counselling, and their hours of listening to those who need a comforting friend, they are incredible examples to our volunteers, and to our clients.



Message from our Program Director

hat a blessing it is to work with our many hospice volunteers.

Truly, it is like being team Captain to a group of Angels!

How can one fully summarize the gifts they give? So many acts of kindness given in unspoken ways daily; our Society would not exist without their devotion to this very sacred work.

A few weeks ago I hosted some of our support groups for the hospice volunteers that work both on the Tertiary Palliative Unit in Surrey Memorial Hospital and in Laurel Place, the twenty bed hospice residence. As I listened to the volunteer's stories I could see how they have been transformed by the very work they are engaged in, often expressing that they receive far more than they give.

One volunteer recently sat vigil at the bedside of a woman whose family members could not be present in the



final moments of life, some were out of town and unable to return in time. It was so soothing for the family to hear that their loved one did not die alone. This was the first time the

volunteer had been with someone as they took their last breath. She felt the absolute privilege of being invited into that moment In turn she wrote a beautiful card and letter to the family sharing tender reflections of the calm and peaceful passing the Mother experienced. Another cherished gift to the family, it brought tears to my eyes reading her words. No doubt the love, care and compassion this hospice volunteer offered added to the ease of transition that this woman experienced. In the simple silence, rich experience was shared between them.

We have both "friends of hospice"

volunteers and those who take the 33 hour course to work with the palliative patients and their families. Whether it is hospice client work, answering phones in the office reception, helping at the Thrift store, volunteering with fund raising events or volunteering at the Board level, each role is invaluable.

I can't thank you enough for all you do. One of our volunteers brought in a little plaque that is displayed in our reception area. It is by an unknown author and reads:

"Volunteers are not paid for their work, Not because they are worthless But because they are priceless......"

How true are those words!

Reflections of a One-to-One Bereavement Volunteer

t was a blustery February day when I first met George, my new one-on-one grief client. George was a soft spoken 84 year-old English gentleman approaching the first anniversary of the death of his beloved wife. They had been married for 63 years. Jessie had died in his arms and he was so very lost without her. His days were barren and meaningless without his best friend and life companion beside him.

Pictures of Jessie were everywhere in the tiny unit–snapshots from family gatherings, cruises, anniversaries-so many wonderful memories captured and framed to reflect back what George so fondly remembered as he faced his future without his wife. "I talk to her picture every day." he said, "I just wish I knew if she hears me."

George made some tea that first afternoon and told me all about his life with Jessie. As Jessie's health declined in their later years he became her caregiver and devoted his days to ensuring she was comfortable and content. It was clear that what George needed now was someone to listen to

his story, someone to witness his life with the woman to whom he was still so dedicated.



Through her death, George had not just lost his life's companion but he'd also lost his job as caregiver, a double whammy for such an active family man. Who would he shop and cook for? Who would he drive to choir practice? Who would he watch the hundreds of hours of homemade video tapes with-a pastime they had both enjoyed. It brought George comfort to reminisce about the way things were and he-like so many of our bereaved clients-needed someone to whom he could connect, who was willing to listen - not just with their ears but also with their heart. The gift of being heard was all that George wanted now as he tried

to find his way through his grief. After that first meeting, George and I spent many, many afternoons together – sometimes sipping tea at his home or going for a bowl of soup at his favourite café, sitting and chatting on a park bench, or walking along the boardwalk at Crescent Beach–talking, laughing and even shedding tears as he spoke of his memories with such love and devotion.

Recently George moved out of the province to live with a family member and I miss our time together. But to everything there is a season and I feel so blessed to have had the privilege of bearing witness to George's story over the months we were together. I know that being a companion on George's journey helped him cope in some small way; helped him find his way to the new normal of the life he faced on his own. And in my heart I have no doubt that Jessie does hear George when he talks to her picture...(names have been changed)

Honouring the Mystery-After Death Communications

any grieving people report unexpected contact communication from their loved one after his or her death without the involvement of external means (e.g. a psychic).

Researcher Bill Guggenheim estimates that 20-40% of mourners experience one or more after-death communications. In his book, Hello from Heaven, Guggenheim cites many accounts of after death communication.

A book entitled Love Lives On by Dr. Louis LaGrand, a grief counsellor for 30 years, also gives testimonies of many clients documenting such profound encounters. As well, the University of Virginia's Department of Perceptual Studies publishes research on this phenomenon.

These experiences can be divided into



"visitations" and "dreams". Visitations usually occur when the mourner is in a relaxed state, concentrating on an activity like reading, or performing routine work. The experience may be in the form of a sign, a message or a felt presence by which the deceased seems to reach out to the bereaved and in doing so provides solace and comfort. Dreams, of course, occur when a mourner is asleep and upon waking, Clinical Counsellor

they report seeing their loved one in another life and often giving them a message. In the article below, the dream message wasn't at first understood by the dreamer until she shared it with another family member who had had a visitation the night before!

Clients usually report that these experiences provide a welcome reassurance during the painful bereavement period. Not all mourners have After-Death Communications. For those who do, we affirm ADCs as insightful milestones along the grief journey. LaGrand states," It is important to honour such a profound experience, examine the mystery surrounding it and use it in adapting to loss and change."

A Tap from the After Life

(ne night , about two months after my mom had passed from lung cancer, I had gone to bed like usual.

During the night I remember having vivid dreams of my mom. She came to me so clearly. Her long dark auburn coloured hair hanging over her shoulders, her piercing hazel eyes staring right through me and her reassuring voice as she said to me "Tell your dad I am sorry for scaring him". I had no idea at the time what she meant but knew that I needed to remember to give my dad that message from her.

In the morning I awoke to find my dad restless and groggy as if he had a sleepless night. I casually mentioned to him, in the way that I did all my dreams about mom, that she wanted me to tell him she was sorry for scaring him.



My dad suddenly looked wide awake and said "What did you say?" As I repeated it again he looked even more surprised as he said "That's wild! Last night at about 3:00am I felt somebody tap me on the shoulder and whisper my name. When I sat up I saw something go up into the ceiling".

Both shocked and at ease, we knew it was moms way of letting us know she was still around.

Finding My Way An Adult Grief Support Group



Monday evenings from 7:00pm-8:30pm July 11-August 22 (excluding August 1)

The purpose of this six-week grief group is to provide support to adult participants grieving the death of someone significant in their life. This group provides a safe environment to explore the central needs of mourning as participants share their individual stories. By sharing one's grief experience with others, participants begin to learn how to integrate this loss into their lives.

according to Alan Wolfelt, Ph.D.:

"When we mourn well, we will go on to live well and love well."

Surrey Hospice bereavement staff and volunteers facilitate each group. This group is generally geared to individuals whose loss to death occurred at least several months ago. If your loss to death is more recent than this, there are other support services open to you through the Surrey Hospice Society.
